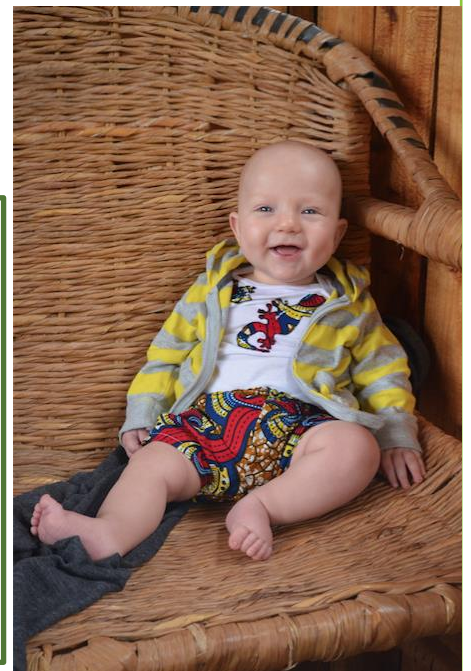
Praying over Gideon at the naming ceremony

Gideon was called "baby" for the first six days of his life. In traditional Rwandan culture, babies are unnamed for a week or so, but then the neighbors are invited to come and offer suggestions for names during a naming ceremony. So it was a great honor for us to have neighbors and friends join us, share snacks together (someone else cooked), offer name suggestions, and pray God's blessing and protection over our baby boy.

We decided on "Gideon" (mighty warrior) because it reminds us that though we are weak and unable, it's God's strength inside us that enables us to do anything he calls us to do. We chose

"Mahoro" because in Kinyarwanda it means *peace*. This is the kind of peace that means "all is well in every relationship: everything is how God wants it to be." We pray our boy will grow up to be a mighty warrior who fights for God's shalom peace!

Gideon is five months old and interested in everything, especially his three-year-old sister, Sarai. He has a few teeth, is sitting up, and is full of smiles. When he gets fussy, a trip outside will calm him down. We're so thankful for our sweet boy! Sarai is enjoying her baby brother too, and she loves to make him laugh! She also enjoys painting with watercolors, playing with her dolls, and playing outside. She is verbally articulate and we love to hear what she's thinking! Moving to Kigali has been a change for us, but we thank God for workers and friends who are here.
