THE DAYS BETWEEN PALM SUNDAY AND EASTER REPRESENT THE MOST SIGNIFICANT WEEK OF THE CHRISTIAN CALENDAR.

That week, Jesus' days are marked by important snapshots, each one inspiring us to greater service and deeper devotion. As we immerse ourselves in the reality of Jesus' persistent and selfless march to Golgotha, we understand why Christians have dedicated this week to worship and reflection.

In our most noble moments, we want to join them. We hope that Jesus' passion might become ours as well. We sense the Lord calling us to walk with him through the events of this Holy Week.

This set of writings helps us accept that invitation. Relying mostly on Mark's Gospel, each reflection focuses on what Jesus was doing on that day and guides us into a similar sort of experience. The format emphasizes discerning prayer and scripture reading. The biblical passages are short and meant to be read three times during each sitting. This allows for a careful reading, allowing the Holy Spirit to guide us into greater awareness of its content. Then, we seek God's insight for our life and in the end, identify a point of practical application. Each day also includes brief notes to prompt deeper reflection.

Notice, there is space to write any of your insights and applications. Recording our observations, insights and applications plants the ideas deeper into our souls, helping them to fully integrate into our lives. Scribbling even a phrase or two is usually beneficial.

You might like to engage in this process with a group of others because it is mutually beneficial to share our experience. The support of other Christians, demonstrated through encouragement and accountability, allows us to more effectively follow Jesus' instructions. Obedience leads to integration. This integration releases us into the abundant life Jesus calls us to enjoy.

The small group experience could revolve around sharing three simple questions: What insights did you receive from your reading? How might you put those insights into practice in everyday life? And, how can we support you – prayer, encouragement, accountability? Spiritual growth thrives in this kind of supportive group.

Finally, you received a copy of this devotional guide because you have supported Jesus' passion through the work of Evangelical Friends Mission. We offer it as a gift, grateful for your support.

Most of all, we pray that it will enhance your relationship with the One we worship during Holy Week. May you experience the transforming power of the resurrection. Expect Christ's passion to become your passion!

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PALM SUNDAY:

The King Knows: The Work's Not Yet Finished

Simple Prayer: Lord, help me to see your work with your eyes!

Read for Context: (What does it say?): Mark 11:7-11

Read for Insight: (What is God saying to me?)

His Passion: Jesus' entrance to Jerusalem exhilarated the crowd. Jesus (the celebrated King himself) was not so impressed. After the parade, Jesus made his way to the temple. He looked around. The view – every nook and cranny packed with extortionists looking to prey on worshippers' sincerity – fueled his commitment to finish the assignment his Father had commissioned to him. It would be demanding to confront a religious system that financially and socially rewarded position, power and pretense over devoted obedience and humble service. There was work to be done.

And not for the first time, the King recognized it would cost him his life!

Read for Application: (How should I respond?)

Possible Application: Ask the Lord to show you where his work is not finished in you, your church, your world. Make a note and look for opportunities to grow or help in those areas!

Short Prayer: Finish your work in me, your Church and in the world.

Our Passion: Jesus' work is still not done. He is answering our prayer that his Kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven. Mysteriously, he has chosen human beings to be his agents. Incredibly, he calls some of his people to leave their own culture and usher in his Kingdom among a different people. We call these persons "missionaries." As we (who are here) send missionaries (who go there), we are all working together to finish the King's work.

MONDAY:

Prayer Is a Conversation, Not a Transaction

Short Prayer: Jesus, teach us to pray!

Read for Context: (What does it say?): Mark 11:15-17

Read for Insight: (What is God saying to me?)

His Passion: The Monday of Holy Week, Jesus insisted (rather strongly, eh?) that the Jerusalem temple was not a place where God's love can be bought or sold. It was to be a place where everyone was welcome. Through their temple experience, everyone can encounter intimacy with the Living God. Jesus calls this practice prayer.

Later, Christians understood the temple as a people rather than a place (for example, Paul in Ephesians 2:21-22). They recognized that Jesus' followers themselves form a hospitable community where everyone can experience communion with God. Again, prayer is the catalyst for this reality.

Often, a call to "pray more" induces a sense of guilt. Most of us recognize we should pray more. We feel badly that we don't. Maybe today, this passage could serve as an invitation (rather than a chore) to venture into deeper fellowship with Christ. We can focus on relationship, shedding any sense that answers to our prayers depend on our performance. Maybe our example will inspire others to do the same.

Read for Application: (How should I respond?)

Possible Application: The disciples were impressed with Jesus' prayer life, and asked Jesus to teach them to pray. Ask the Lord to deepen your prayer life as well. Set apart time today or tomorrow to extend your usual prayer time – five minutes is a good start.

Short Prayer: Lord, teach me to pray with the same conviction that you prayed.

Our Passion: The essence of the Gospel is that our relationship with God is not dependent on appeasing his anger or earning his pleasure. It is a gracious summons into a life filled with ongoing interaction with him. It is one of our great motivations for carrying the Good News to other cultures. Missionaries attest that the joy of prayer (as a relationship rather than a transaction) is embraced by new Christians with such enthusiasm that they themselves are inspired to pray more. This communion is a part of the power of the resurrection. Our passion is to grip it more tightly.

TUESDAY:

Jesus' Invitation to a Full and Free Life

Short Prayer: May I find delight in you and your Word today!

Read for Context: (What does it say?): Mark 12:35-37

Read for Insight: (What is God saying to me?)

His Passion: This story comes during a long day of teaching. Jesus' words bathed the listener's soul in truth, grace and love. His instruction wasn't designed to impress. Its purpose was to transform. People relished them.

Read for Application: (How should I respond?)

Possible Application: Read all of Mark 11:20 – 13:37 (a record of all of Jesus' teaching on this day) or all of the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7), considered to be some of the greatest teachings of all time.

Short Prayer: Teach me to delight in your teaching and to put it into practice.

Our Passion: We rely on the work of the Holy Spirit to take scripture and help us envision a changed life. When this kind of conviction lands, and when we don't just hear it but do it, Jesus' word change us. Our missionaries regularly tell stories of this kind of transformation. WEDNESDAY:

Grace, Gratitude and Generosity

Short Prayer: Cultivate in me a thankful and generous heart!

Read for Context: (What does it say?): Mark 14:3-9

Read for Insight: (What is God saying to me?)

His Passion: While we don't know much of what happened on the Wednesday of Holy Week. Many believe it's the day a woman performed an act so full of gratitude, generosity and grace that Jesus added it to the Gospel Hall of Fame. The story is sparse in detail. Clearly, though, the women's expression of faith touched Jesus. This woman obviously knew Jesus, had encountered an extraordinary touch of his grace, and could "see" (in a way that many others couldn't) that he was on his way to a tomb. Her generous and grateful response stirs us to this day.

Read for Application: (How should I respond?)

Possible Application: Find a financial need. Lavishly and anonymously answer it. You don't need to announce it. Jesus will know.

Short Prayer: May my generosity flow out of deep gratitude for your grace in my life!

Our Passion: From the beginning of the Church, God's work has been funded by the generous contributions of God's people gratefully responding to God's grace. That process is still in play and God's Kingdom flourishes around the world today because of it. God's people send missionaries so that others will experience the Jesus grace. This is how it has worked with EFM for 60 years. Those of us who see this generosity up close are deeply touched and grateful. Thank you!

MAUNDY THURSDAY:

The Flavor of Salvation

Short Prayer: Teach me to “taste” your sacrifice.

Read for Context: (What does it say?): Mark 14:22-26

Read for Insight: (What is God saying to me?)

His Passion: Jesus celebrated a Passover meal on the night before his death. During it, he invited his disciples to a greater understanding of the Passover. His own coming sacrifice – a broken body and shed blood – would provide salvation to all who would partake. Undoubtedly, those who shared the table didn’t fully comprehend the gravity of his actions nor the implications of his words. Still, they could see his care and hear his affection. Certainly, this Passover meal carried a weighty yet bewildering meaning...

...and so, unsure exactly how to respond, they did what they knew how to do. They sang.

Read for Application: (How should I respond?)

Possible Application: Inventory the ways you have experienced God’s salvation. Use these as an impetus to worship.

Short Prayer: Salvation is mine.

Our Passion: We do not always comprehend the depth of Jesus’ work in our lives. However, like the disciples, we see his care and love for every person. We are grateful that his desire that all would experience eternal life includes us. This truth awakens within us a compelling purpose: that this salvation would not only transform us, but also our children and grandchildren, our neighbors, our co-workers, and even those who live far away. This mission is our expression of love. It is our passion.

GOOD FRIDAY:

God Dies...

Short Prayer: May I experience your passion!

Read for Context: (What does it say?): Mark 15:37-39

Read for Insight: (What is God saying to me?)

His Passion: With his last gasp of breath, Jesus declared that he had accomplished his life's work. He became obedient to death, even to death on the cross. Ironically, while many around him spoke of his defeat, in pronouncing "it is finished," Jesus declared victory.

The intensity of this moment reverberated across the valley, burst upon the temple, and slashed the partition excluding mortals from the chamber that was God's alone. No more separation! God's presence is accessible to all. The significance of the moment was palpable to those paying attention. Even the Roman executioner recognized Jesus' death as inexplicably marked by divinity. Somehow, this man undeniably was the Son of God.

Read for Application: (How do I respond?)

Possible Application: Humbly reflect on the passion of Christ.

Short Prayer: I am unable to repay your kindness. I accept it humbly. You are my Savior. You are my God.

Our Passion: The curtain is torn. Nothing stands between flawed humanity and perfect God. We are humbled by the combination of kindness and power that distinguishes Jesus' love. It tears down the walls that separate Jesus and humanity, and humans from one another. This deep work of Jesus, a breathtaking work that knocks us to our knees is accomplished on behalf of every single person. Just as Jesus' love compelled him to finish his work, his love compels us to act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with our God...

...even if it costs us everything.

QUIET SATURDAY:

There Is Power in Waiting

Short Prayer: Teach me to wait on you...

Read for Context: (What does it say?): Mark 15:42-43

Read for Insight: (What is God saying to me?)

His Passion: What now? Jesus hung limp. On a cross. Joseph of Arimathea hurried to retrieve the corpse and entomb it before the nation shut down for Sabbath. The next morning, still Sabbath, Joseph found himself still waiting. He had thought the wait was over. His hope had surged as he heard Jesus promise the Kingdom's fulfillment. Now the Messiah was dead and laid in a garden grave meant to be his own. He sits sequestered away, beleaguered with sorrow, fear, questions. Will the Kingdom of God ever come?

Within the doubt, however, Joseph may have recalled Jesus insisting, "On the third day [the Son of Man] will be raised to life?" It was seed of hope, planted deep in his soul. Sometimes, it takes time for a sprout to rise up out of the ground, right?

So, he waited.

Read for Application: (How will I respond?)

Possible Application: Be still and know that God is God. He will be exalted in the nations. He will be made known on earth. Wait for it.

Short Prayer: I will wait on you, Lord. You are at work. I can't see it yet. So, I will wait.

Our Passion: Throughout history, Jesus' followers have found themselves waiting. 120 waited in an upper room. Fifty days later, the Holy Spirit came on them in power. Paul and the other early missionaries waited for direction in Troas. The door finally opened for them into Macedonia. The Gospel spread into new frontiers eventually covering the Roman Empire.

Waiting is a part of the Christian life. We depend so completely on Jesus' direction that we don't budge until Jesus tells us to move. But when he speaks and we follow, the result is transforming. So, we wait – expectantly, humbly and knowingly. Our stillness affirms Jesus is the one who does it and that he does it best.

So, wait for it!

EASTER:

He Is Risen

Short Prayer: Teach me how to rejoice in you!

Read for Context: (What does it say?): Mark 16:4-8

Read for Insight: (What is God saying to me?)

His Passion: This morning was unfolding unexpectedly. The out-of-place boulder tipped them off. Then, a resplendent figure sat inside the tomb. Finally, the inconceivable words, “He is risen!” Jesus is dead no more. Overwhelmed by the moment, the next words – go tell the disciples to meet Jesus in Galilee – hardly registered. Terror-stricken, they turned, fled and spoke to no one.

Obviously, they recovered. Later, they did spread the word. But, in that instant, a resurrection was beyond comprehension. Resurrection reveals inconceivable degrees of supremacy, potency, authority. Resurrection unleashes power that transforms defeat into victory, shame into honor, condemnation into absolution, rejection into belonging, despair into hope, foolishness into wisdom, old into new, death into life for all who believe. Jesus wields this power. The resurrection is his coronation. He is the everlasting King of Kings.

Read for Application: (How will I respond?)

Possible Application: Wear joy on your sleeve today (and sing loud)!

Short Prayer: You are my King! Hallelujah!

Our Passion: The resurrection is Jesus’ ultimate expression of victory. His power, strength and sovereignty wrapped in deep love fuels his ongoing redemptive work in all creation. His followers fully (and undeservedly) enjoy all the benefits of this resurrection power. On this day, we passionately worship our King, recognize his might, humbly accept his love and joyfully commit to his reign in our lives, in his Church and in the world.

We join the loud chorus of Christians who greet this day and one another with the declaration: “He is risen! He is risen indeed!”

THE MONDAY AFTER:

Make Disciples

Short Prayer: Teach me how the power of the resurrection can transform the world!

Read for Context: (What does it say?): Matthew 28:18-20

Read for Insight: (What is God saying to me?)

His Passion: Jesus made his ultimate command clear. He is unwilling that any should perish and desires that all would experience eternal life. He opened his Kingdom to all who would enter. His plan centers on his followers making disciples. It is well within his authority to commission this venture and he furnishes his people with everything they need to achieve this eternity-altering assignment.

Jesus unleashes this gospel of power to transform the world.

Read for Application: (How should I respond?)

Possible Application: Who around you could use a taste of Jesus' transformation? Pray for them!

Short Prayer: Jesus, you are a great teacher. Teach me to tap into the power of the resurrection to make disciples, even today.

Our Passion: Maybe making disciples is less intimidating than we think. Jesus teaches that we grow spiritually when we listen to his voice and then follow (John 10). That is the essence of discipleship.

At its simplest, then, disciple-making is "helping others grow spiritually." We help people grow spiritually by helping them listen to Jesus' voice and to follow. This is the essence of disciple-making.

Perhaps this loose translation of the Great Commission can ease our doubts. "I [Jesus] have complete control of the universe. So, everywhere you go, help everyone you encounter grow spiritually, immersing them into the fullness of the Trinity, training them to follow me in every way. And don't forget. I am with you – forever!"

This is a vision of a world-wide movement of disciple-making. It is our privilege to follow our King into this life. It is full of service, sacrifice and significance. It is the abundant life. It is our passion.


