
Thank you for your ongoing support of EFM and our mission to spread the gospel to the ends of the earth. Together, let us serve the Lord and

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Here's an incredible story about a man named Arthur Chilson. Imagine the

year 1872 in Iowa, where Arthur was born. He grew up in a time when people were really excited about something called revivalism, which is like a big party to celebrate faith. Arthur felt something special during one of these revival series — he felt a strong calling to become a missionary in Africa!

Now, Arthur wasn't just any missionary. He was super brave and had a big heart. After feeling what he called a "second work of grace," he became a pastor in 1899. But that wasn't enough for him. In 1902, he packed his bags and headed all the way to Africa with three friends. Can you imagine going on such a cool adventure?

When they got to Africa, Arthur didn't just sit around. Oh no! He got busy setting up a mission in Western Kenya. He believed in something called the Industrial Mission approach, which means he cared more

about helping people's hearts than fixing their physical problems. How awesome is that?


Even when Arthur faced tough times and didn't always agree with other missionaries, he never lost sight of his goal: to help people believe in Jesus while still celebrating their own culture. He and his wife, Edna, worked really hard, building stuff, learning new languages, and making friends with everyone they met.

But here's the coolest part: Arthur wasn't just there to do everything himself. Nope, he believed in empowering the local African people to lead their own ministries. Thanks to him, lots of churches popped up, and they even started schools and medical centers. Talk about making a difference!

Arthur's journey wasn't easy. He faced all sorts of challenges, but he never gave up. His love for sharing the good news, his passion for helping others, and his kindness left a mark that lasts even today. Can you believe that about 400,000 Quakers in East and Central Africa see Arthur Chilson as one of their heroes? He truly was an amazing missionary!

the life of Ruth Esther Smith, a true hero in Quaker missionary history. Picture the year 1870 in Ohio, where Ruth was born. She grew up to be an incredible leader with a legacy that still shines bright today.

Ruth's adventure began in Long Beach, where her family moved when she was just a kid. Can you imagine exploring a new place like that? She even went to a school that later became Azusa Pacific University (APU) — how cool is that? Inspired by the Wesleyan holiness movement, she trained at the Sunshine Mission in San Francisco, where she learned all about helping people who really needed it.

But Ruth didn't stop there. Oh no! She became the pastor of Long Beach Friends Church and then set off on an epic mission to Chiquimula, Guatemala in 1906 with her friend Cora Wildman. They didn't have much, but that didn't stop them from spreading the good news of Jesus. They learned Spanish and rode mules for miles and miles, teaching people about God and setting up schools for boys and girls.


Ruth was all about preaching holiness and showing people how to surrender to God's love. She even became the boss, training other workers and helping the church grow a lot, especially during the amazing Chiquimula Revival! Plus, she started the Berea Bible Institute and even helped with missions in Bolivia — talk about a busy superhero for God!

What made Ruth really special was her kindness, her smarts, and her love for talking to God. She believed everyone should have a chance to spread the good news, no matter if they were a boy or a girl. She respected everyone she met, especially the indigenous people she worked with.

Even when things got tough, Ruth never gave up. She stayed in Guatemala and helped the church grow to over 4500 believers! Her leadership, her trust in God, and her love for helping others left a big mark on the world. She was truly an amazing missionary for God!

Everett Cattell, a true legend in EFM's missionary history. Born in 1905, he was like a giant among men, spreading the good news of Jesus far and wide despite facing so many challenges along the way.

Everett's story started when he was just a kid, growing up in Ohio with a strong belief that he wanted to be a missionary. Can you imagine dreaming of big adventures like that? He learned all about serving God from his family and the Friends Holiness Movement, which taught him to love God with all his heart.

After getting married to Catherine DeVol and serving as a pastor for a while, Everett felt the call to go to India in 1936. But boy, did he face some tough times! From dealing with what society expected of him to struggling with his health, Everett never gave up. He became a leader

among Christians in India, bringing people together from different churches and teaching them all about Jesus.


Everett didn't just talk the talk — he walked the walk too. He believed in showing God's love through everything he did, especially when he worked with the Chamar community, helping them, and sharing the good news at the same time.

What made Everett really special was how he believed in empowering local leaders and letting people express their faith in their own way. He wrote a book called "The Spirit of Holiness" where he talked about how important it is to listen to God and show love to others, just like Jesus did.

healthcare and education. His mission wasn't just about saving souls; it was about making life better for the Aymara people in every way possible.


